

William Myatt (Major Gift Solutions)

Centering Care, Consent and Community in Cultural Storytelling (Dearborn B)

Tom Clowes

Tom Clowes, Co-Executive Director of Crossing Borders Music, founded the organization and served as its Board President from 2011 to 2015, at which time he became Executive Director. Crossing Borders Music is a multicultural organization of color that shares the stories and music of those whose voices are suppressed because of race, ethnicity, disability, gender, sexual orientation, other identity, or related trauma. We do this through free, accessible programs in community spaces in service and affirmation of our communities and collaborators. The mission of Crossing Borders Music is to use music to promote the dignity of people from all cultures.

Bora Un

Bora Un is the managing director of ART WORKS Projects, a Chicago and The Hague-based visual arts non-profit dedicated to advancing social justice and human rights through documentary film and photography. Founded in 2006, AWP's projects have been presented on five continents, in 35+ countries, with 225 partners, and in collaboration with more than 200 artists to produce visual advocacy tools which produce action on human rights crises at the grassroots, media, and policy levels. Outside of her role at AWP, Bora runs an independent consulting practice offering strategic consulting services to arts and culture, non-profit, and higher education institutions.

Kaoru Watanabe

Karou Watanabe is a nurse by training and has worked in various multidisciplinary environments throughout her career in Japan, Egypt, and the

U.S. Since 2008 she has been working with the National Cambodian Heritage Museum & Killing Fields Memorial and the Cambodian Association of Illinois, where she integrates holistic approach to health; knowledge of intergenerational transmission of culture, history, and trauma; and the power of arts in healing. She received her B.S from St. Luke's College of Nursing in Tokyo, Japan, and M.S. from the University of Illinois at Chicago. She conducted her dissertation research with Cambodian families residing in Chicago.

Digitizing Cultural Identity: Preserving Chicago's Filipino and Puerto Rican Histories (ILC)

Jessica BrodeFrank

Jessica BrodeFrank (Moderator) spent the last decade in cultural heritage institutions, running DAMS, digital humanities research, and digital curation. She held positions at the Georgetown University Library, Adler Planetarium, Academy of Motion Pictures Arts and Sciences, and Smithsonian's NAA, Gardens, NPG, and NMAAHC, She completed her doctorate in Digital Humanities at University of London, and currently serves a joint appointment as Assistant Clinical Professor and Digital Projects Librarian at the University of Illinois Chicago and Portal Manager for Chicago Collections Consortium. Her research and work focus on crowdsourcing as a means of digital engagement, and the enrichment of metadata taxonomies with these diverse voices as a way towards inclusive search and digital literacy.

Ashley Dequilla

Ashley Dequilla, is an artist-filmmaker and archivist of Negrense, Tagalog and Ilonggo descent. In 2023, she obtained her Masters of Fine Arts in Moving Image from the University of Illinois at Chicago, where she is currently enrolled as an MA student in Art History. She is a Co-Curator Partner and researcher of the Philippine Heritage Collection at the Field Museum of Natural History and a member of the Association of Moving Image Archivists (AMIA). Ashley is the collection manager for the Filipino American Historical Society of Chicago, and works as a processing archivist to preserve its analog film collection with University of Chicago, securing the National Film Preservation Foundation award in 2024.

Jorge Félix

Jorge Felix is the Program Director of the Exhibition & Collections Program at the Puerto Rican Arts Alliance, where he oversees El Archivo Project, a digital initiative dedicated to preserving the history of Puerto Ricans in the Midwest. Under his leadership, El Archivo has digitized over 2,500 images and is progressing toward public access and community exchange of its collection. Félix spearheads curatorial and exhibition development, focusing on local community histories, art, and photographic collections within the broader context of diasporic cultural exchanges. In addition to his community curatorial work, he is a visual artist and a current fellow at both the Library of Congress' American Folklife Center, where he is documenting Chicago's West Side food culture, and the Threewalls Foundation, where his research examines the loss of cultural and racial identity. His work explores the racial divide between Black and Latin@ communities on Chicago's West Side, as well as the role of art and West African spiritual systems in bridging these historical and social gaps.

Demetrio P. Maguidad

Demetrio P. Maguidad is a strategist, designer, and creative producer spanning 25 years of experience. He is the owner of Polyrhythmic, a design strategy and creative studio with a focus on building relationships and projects aimed at creating stories and designing meaningful experiences that enable us to think about the world differently and influence new ways to shape change. His current

focus-area of work prioritizes arts, media, and culture with interests in exploring their relation to social justice, the environment, and innovation. Prior to founding Polyrhythmic, he was the Principal Director of Design Strategy for 12 years at LimeRed, a certified B-Corp agency where he worked with social entrepreneurs and local and global nonprofit organizations and foundations on business, brand, and product strategy.

Dr. Ignacio López

Dr. Ignacio López, is an accomplished leader in arts, education, and nonprofit management, serving as the Executive Director of the Puerto Rican Arts Alliance (PRAA). Born in San Juan and raised in Caguas, Puerto Rico, he is dedicated to preserving Puerto Rican heritage and fostering cross-cultural exchange. With a background in higher education leadership, including roles as President of Harold Washington College and Dean at National Louis University, Dr. López has championed Latino student success and secured major funding for STEM programs in underserved communities. An author and speaker, he has written Keeping It Real and Relevant (2017) and The EQ Way (2024), focusing on leadership, emotional intelligence, and cultural advocacy.

Bridging the Gap Between Cultural Heritage and Future Leadership (Dearborn B)

Dr. Melanie Flores

Dr. Melanie Flores is a passionate nonprofit leader and arts advocate with expertise in program development, grant funding, and community engagement. As Senior Program Director at the Puerto Rican Arts Alliance (PRAA), she oversees the strategic growth and impact of PRAA's music, arts, and cultural programs. With a strong

background in fundraising, Dr. Flores has helped secure millions in philanthropic support for arts education and community initiatives. She specializes in building cross-sector partnerships and expanding access to high-quality arts programming. Previously, she held leadership roles at Kids First Chicago and National Louis University, advancing education equity and inclusion. Dr. Flores holds a doctorate in Higher Education Leadership, a Master of Science in Production, and a Bachelor of Arts in Communication. A published author on culturally relevant pedagogy, she continues to champion equitable access to arts and education.

Curating Exhibitions During Wartime (ILC)

Adrienne Kochman

Adrienne Kochman, PhD is an art historian, curator and educator from Chicago. Formerly Associate Professor of Art History and Adjunct Associate Professor of Women's and Gender Studies at Indiana University Northwest, she currently teaches at the SAIC and since 2017, is curator at the Ukrainian Institute of Modern Art. Projects include Increment: Barbara Cooper, Shona MacDonald, Yoonshin Park (2018); Raw Reckoning: Michael Paxton (2019) and Michel Andreenko: Revisited and Michel Andreenko and Ukrainian Artists in Paris (2022) on the Ukrainian modernist. Agency: Craft in Chicago from the 1970s-80s and Beyond is her latest project for Art Design Chicago 2024, supported by the Terra Foundation.

Media Relations for Cultural Heritage Institutions (Cardinal)

Carrie Shepherd

Carrie Shepherd is a reporter at Axios Chicago, a daily newsletter covering news, culture and curiosity in Chicago. Before that, Carrie was the founding executive producer of City Cast Chicago, a daily podcast and newsletter about all things Chicago. She was also a reporter, producer and

editor at WBEZ, Chicago's NPR station, for 15 years.

Diane Bou Khalil

Diane Bou Kalil is an accomplished engagement and audience leader, Diane has five years of immigration journalism experience. As Marketing and Engagement Manager, Diane leads Borderless' award-winning field canvassing work and works to make sure the news outlet's reporting reaches those who need it most. After growing up in Lebanon, Diane earned her bachelor's degree in sociology from Northeastern Illinois University and a master's degree in international studies from DePaul University. She is also an alumna of the Emma Bowen Foundation Leadership Program and previously taught journalism at After School Matters, a nonprofit serving Chicago teens.

Gwen Ihnat

Gwen Ihnat is the inaugural Arts & Culture Editor at Block Club Chicago, a vital nonprofit hyperlocal newsroom covering all of the city's neighborhoods. A lifelong Chicagoan, she was a writer and editor for The A.V. Club, the pop-culture arm of The Onion, for several years, and an editor at the Chicago History Museum for nearly a decade. She was also a writer and editor in the newsroom at WBBM-AM, Chicago's only all-news radio station, and has written for publications like Entertainment Weekly and The Wrap. She lives in Ravenswood with her husband, teen twins and pandemic puppy.

Building Your Volunteer Base (IL-C)

Ezekiel Alexander

Ezekiel Alexander is the Volunteer Relations Coordinator at Chicago Cares. He currently serves as a board member for Dekalb Pride and organized anti-racist demonstrations in the community. Mr. Alexander is a proud GenZ-er who takes a community-centric approach to volunteer cultivation. Ezekiel's experience as a community activist both on the ground and behind the scenes allows him to bring authenticity in leadership from an

anti-white supremacist lens.

Lavne Borden

Layne Borden is the Community Engagement Manager at the Swedish American Museum: working to coordinate volunteers both for dayto-day tasks of a small museum, and for large events like Andersonville's Midsommarfest. She has worked with volunteers for the past four years, seeking to uplift and connect those in the Museum's community.

Robert Pabon

Rob is an accomplished non-profit leader and community organizer who has dedicated his life and career to creating opportunities for others and moving folks to action. Rob was elected 5th Ward Alderman in April of 2021. Prior to beginning his four-year term on May 11th, 2021, Rob served on the Board of Education for Berwyn North School District 98. He is also the co-founder of the Berwyn Free Library Initiative, a grassroots organization that promotes bi-literacy, community building and access to resources for all. In his current role at Citizen University, he coaches community leaders across the country to build civic culture and strengthen civic faith in their neighborhoods.

Community Gardening as Heritage Practice and Social Action (IL - AB)

Andrew Leith,

Andrew Leith is a Ph.D. candidate at Northwestern University in the Anthropology Department with a focus on historical archaeology, heavy metal soil toxicity, first-voice histories, and community gardening throughout the Chicagoland area. His research explores how nearly two centuries of heavy industry in urban Chicago have affected soil toxicity in marginalized communities where community gardening plays a significant role in wellbeing, and what communities are doing today to contend with this legacy. Beyond archaeology, Andrew has 19 years of professional

experience in museum anthropology and served as the Director of Cultural Programs and Museum Practice at CCA from 2017-2021. As a fifth-generation Chicagoan he has deep ties to local communities throughout the city as well as an abiding commitment to grassroots heritage preservation initiatives.

Ana Aparicio

Ana Aparicio is an Associate Professor in the Department of Anthropology and in the Latino Studies Program at Northwestern University. A cultural anthropologist, her work focuses on Latino communities, youth, race, and local politics and organizing. Her most recent work analyzes various ways that Latinos are altering suburban social, political, and economic landscapes; she pays particular attention to how arts and community gardening initiatives have become central to these communities in recent years.

Irena Čaiková

Irena Čajková is an instructional professor at the University of Chicago, where she teaches both Spanish and Czech. Deeply committed to heritage language education, she has been teaching Czech to children at the T. G. Masaryk School for over 15 years. In addition to language instruction, she volunteers her time organizing cultural programs that promote and preserve Czech heritage. She also serves on the Prague Committee of Chicago Sister Cities International. In partnership with local Hispanic organizations, she co-organizes events that celebrate the connections between the two cultures, especially in neighborhoods where Czech and Hispanic histories meet.

Paty Flores

Paty Flores is the Community Programs Coordinator at Lincoln Park Zoo. With 5 years of community engagement experience, Paty strives to assist and collaborate with communities to foster curiosity and empathy for nature. Also currently pursuing a graduate degree in biology, Paty is furthering her understanding and practice of inquiry-

based learning and how one's environment and community can make an impact in an individual's wellbeing. Paty enjoys identifying urban wildlife in the Chicagoland area and learning through conversations with community members.

Rosalvn Owens

Rosalyn Owens is the Executive Director for the Bronzeville Neighborhood Farm. Rosalyn's husband, Johnnie L. Owens, Jr., who was a wellknown urban planner and community organizer in the Bronzeville community started the Bronzeville Neighborhood Farm in 2017, but he was killed in August 2021. Immediately without much thought about it, Rosalyn made the decision to continue her husband's work to grow organic vegetables and educate the community about healthy eating choices at the Farm to continue his legacy.

Shavna Wildermuth

Shayna Wildermuth is the Greenhouse and Garden Education Manager at the Garfield Park Conservatory Alliance. She grew up on a farm in central Illinois and has a degree in horticulture. Shayna manages a greenhouse in which the propagation of many kinds of plants takes place. She also manages an outdoor garden in which all the produce is donated to local organizations. Shayna loves how her position combines her love for people and plants and especially loves leading hands-on experiences with people who live in the Garfield Park neighborhood of which she is also a resident.

Getting Started with Collecting Oral Histories (Dearborn B)

Sherry Williams

Sherry Williams and her three daughters established the Bronzeville Historical Society. They each were eye witnesses to the destruction of African American cultural sites, historic buildings and Chicago Public Housing. In 2002, The Society became a family led 501 c 3 educational institutions to preserve historic sites and history. Public support grew when Civil War era guided tours began. In 2011, the Society received a grant from the Chicago Architecture Foundation to conduct the Underground Railroad / Chicago Freedom Tours. Sherry soon took on the roles of historian, curator, collector, and museum director. She holds a BA in Education, and a Master's in Library and Information Sciences. For 25 years, Sherry has managed the Society's public programs, guided bus and walking tours, mentored students and supervised volunteer staffing. Visitors and guests enjoy storytelling portrayal experiences on the Underground Railroad Tours. Sherry led the effort to place a headstone on the grave of Mrs. Nancy Green on September 5, 2020. Nancy Green was the Original Aunt Jemima pancake product icon. Her success includes a 2023-2024 Mellon Foundation grant for training tour guides. Sherry is also the recipient of the 2017 Northeastern Illinois Outstanding Student Award, the 2021 University of Illinois Urbana - Champaign Distinguished Alumni Recognition Award; a 2022 City of Chicago Commission on Chicago Landmarks - Landmarks Advocacy Award, and a 2024 Illinois Humanities

Liú Chen

Liú Chen (they/them) is a queer, trans non-binary, disabled, and abolitionist cultural organizer, descended from the islands of Taiwan and Ireland. They are currently the Oral History Programs Manager at the National Public Housing Museum. They center equity and attentive care in their work, supported by their 2023 Chicago United for Equity Fellowship. They view storytelling and narrative history as key strategies for thawing trauma, empowering connection, and creating radical change. Their personal work focuses on anti-imperialism, queer/trans liberation, Black/ Asian coalition movements, and the textures of silence and absence.
